Dear Friends,

As the New Year begins, the Staten Island Museum invites you to experience new offerings and the incredible art, natural science, and history collections we have right here on Staten Island for you to learn about and enjoy.

We are proud to introduce Access Art for All, a new program that provides cultural outings and hands-on art experiences for children, teens, and young adults with Autism Spectrum Disorder and their families. A series of monthly programs will rotate between the Staten Island Museum, the Staten Island Children's Museum, and the Staten Island Zoo, developed in partnership with the GRACE Foundation. The first Museum program will be Sunday Art Studio: Lenape Workshop on Sunday, January 20th (see page 7).

As a continuation of *Black Lunch Table* artist programming held in the fall that invited the community to participate in conversations about matters of race and culture, a *Wikipedia Edit-a-thon session will take place on Saturday, February* **9th** to learn how you can help shape the stories and history that is told (see page 8).

Don't miss the highly anticipated **Korean Lunar New Year Celebration on Saturday, February 2,** presented in collaboration with the Korean Community Development Center, to welcome the Year of the Pig. When you visit, be sure to ask for an audio-guide at the front desk so that you can hear the latest artist project at the Museum: **Audio Stories by APMD** (logo by Christopher Prosser, featured on cover).

Behind the scenes we are always working hard taking care of collections and finding new ways to share the Museum's holdings. In anticipation of the centennial of the 19th Amendment in 2020, the Staten Island Museum received a grant to digitize two periodical collections from the Museum's archives: *The Suffragist* and *The Women Voter*. They are now publicly accessible online (see article on page 11).

SUPER SCIENCE



The Museum's winter Super Science workshops will spotlight the chemistry of our daily lives, taught by science educator and Staten Island Advance columnist Clay Wollney.

Clay has been leading hands-on science lessons at the Museum for decades. His interest in natural science was sparked at the age of four when a box turtle wandered into his backyard. Throughout his youth and adolescence, Clay explored the woodlands of Staten Island and began working as a nature guide in High Rock Park at age 15. Clay accepted a position with the National Park Service at **Gateway National Recreation Area** following his graduation from NYU. In 1978, he joined the faculty of Staten Island Academy, where he has taught thousands of children to love science. He served as Science Department Chair from 1995 to 2005, and is presently the science

specialist for the Early Childhood and Lower School divisions.
Other activities include science clubs at Blue Heron Park and the Staten Island Museum, leading walks for Protectors of Pine-Oaks Woods, and writing the "Ask Clay" column in the Staten Island Advance.

Black Lunch Table – Wikipeda Edit-a-thon II

Black Lunch Table is an ongoing collaboration between artists **Heather Hart** and **Jina Valentine** to facilitate the discussion of issues pertaining to race and culture and to create an online oral history archive of the recorded conversations. The **Black Lunch Table Wikipedia Edit-a-thon** mobilizes the

creation and improvement of a sitespecific set of Wikipedia articles that pertain to the lives and works of Black artists and other relevant subjects.

Black Lunch Table will teach participants to make quality contributions to Wikipedia, creating a space to train more editors of color and asking white allies to spend time focusing on subjects that may lack coverage. The artists explain, "This is 'Radical archiving' with the purpose of filling gaps in this highly accessed archive and the [art] historical record."

No prior knowledge of editing is required! *Black Lunch Table* will provide a short introduction to the platform and assistance. Bring your own laptop.

THE WOMAN VOTER AND THE SUFFRAGIST



In anticipation of the centennial of the 19th Constitutional Amendment in 2020, the Staten Island Museum received a grant from the Metropolitan New York Library Council to digitize two periodical collections from the Museum's archives covering women's fight for the right to vote.

The public can now read and search through 78 issues of *The Woman Voter*, which covered the campaign for women's right to vote in New York State including opinion pieces, updates about planned activities, and lists of major donors submitted by local suffragists. Also available are 304 issues of *The Suffragist* which was published by the Congressional

Union for Woman Suffrage and covered national political news and major events within the movement.

Paging through the Museum's collection of suffrage periodicals, readers will encounter well-known figures in the history of the movement like Alice Paul and Carrie Chapman Catt along with lesser-known leaders like Mary Otis Willcox and Edith Whitmore, two Staten Islanders who brought awareness to women's struggle for the right to vote.

Consisting of over six thousand pages, this has become the most complete digital collection of each of the periodicals available to the public. As the National Centennial of Women's Suffrage approaches, this collection will provide researchers, educators, and students with easy access to primary source material to help them explore and engage with this important moment in history. *The Woman Voter* and *The Suffragist* tell the story of the movement through the words and perspectives of the actual people who helped women claim their right to vote.

Support for the digitization was provided by Metropolitan New York Library Council (METRO).


