#### Alice M. Anderson

1919 - 1999

The Apostle James said that 'Faith without works is dead.' Alice's life was a testament that she believed her destiny was to serve. She indeed proved her faith knowing that only what she did for Christ would count. She found joy in living as well as giving which she did so naturally and unselfishly. She did help somebody; she did not live in vain.

It would be difficult to sum up her life in a few words, but many knew her in one capacity or another — as a sister, a friend, a teacher, a fellow worker, a community leader, and above all, as a devout christian.

Alice was born in McDonald, Pennsylvania, on January 7, 1919, the second daughter of William Givens and Katherine Gore Anderson. She was educated in the McDonald public school system. She became a baptized believer at an early age, using her beautiful talent of music to glorify the Lord.

Following her graduation from McDonald High School, Alice obtained a Bachelor's degree in Secondary Education from Alabama State College, Montgomery, AL (1954). She acquired a Master's degree in Guidance and Counseling from New York University (1957), and a second Master's degree in Reading from Jersey City State College (1975).

Alice's major was music with specialization in Voice; her minor was English with specialization in Drama. She was highly regarded for her broad professional experience in education. She also made her mark in the early part of the century when she performed with the National Negro Opera Company at Carnegie Hall, among other concert venues, as a contralto soloist and musical artist. She studied voice at Knoxville College, TN and the Juilliard School of Music in New York City.

She "put her education on hold for nine years" because of illness in her family and moved to Castleton Corners in 1943. She was employed by the Veterans Administration in New York City. In 1947, she worked as a Licensed Practical Nurse at Sea View Hospital. In 1952, she taught music at Alabama State College, Montgomery, AL. She returned to a teaching position at the Port Richmond Day Nursery in 1956 and in 1958 became the resident director-counselor at Southern University, Baton Rouge, LA. In 1962, Alice returned permanently to Staten Island and taught special education at PS 25 for the New York City Board of Education until her retirement in 1985.

Her retirement only meant more time for Alice to work more prodigiously for her church and in the community on Staten Island and Lakewood, NJ where she resided from 1990 to 1994. She served faithfully as a Eucharistic Minister and was a member of the Legion of Mary at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel/St. Benedicta R.C. Church. She is a life member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and the National Council for Negro Women. She holds memberships in Lambda Chapter, Lambda Kappa Mu Sorority, Inc., a business and professional women's sorority, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, the Urban League, Sandy Ground Historical Society, Universal Theatre of the Arts and Project Hospitality.

Alice leaves a rich legacy, love and beautiful memories for those who feel a keen sense of loss in her passing, especially her cousins: Charlene and Charles Hall, Deborah McNeil and Dawn Watkins, Harrisburg, PA; Raymond and Henrietta Gray, Gaithersburg, MD; the Carter Clan, Pittsburgh, PA and Washington, DC. Among those whose life she has touched in a special way is Pamela "Pam" Washington and Anna May Sellenthin with whom she shared the most sacred bond of friendship.

Included with those who will share reflections of many beautiful moments is a universe of "special friends" and associates, and her beloved "sisters" in Lambda Kappa Mu.
